

Sleep medicine is an important outpatient service with broad implications for public health as it relates to hypertension, stroke, heart failure, metabolic derangements, depression, and many other medical conditions. Recently, there has been growing acknowledgement that diagnosis and treatment of sleep disorders is also crucial to optimal management of acute illnesses and decompensations of chronic diseases. Sleep disorders may impact perioperative outcomes, stroke morbidity, cancer treatment responses, and respiratory failure outcomes.

This course is designed to help providers recognize and understand the implications of sleep disorders in the high-acuity setting including among inpatients, cancer patients, perioperative patients, and in those with decompensated respiratory failure or cardiovascular disease. The course will provide an overview of up-to-date advances in this novel area of sleep medicine. Information presented will highlight of recent data linking sleep disturbances to these comorbidities as well as advanced clinical strategies for approaching sleep disorders in high-risk patient populations. Providers will learn about the changing landscape of sleep medicine therapies, gain insight about what the future holds for sleep medicine, and understand how these developments relate to their medical practice.
